We are proud of the achievements of our students, alumni, and faculty, and believe that Cardozo's accomplishments are unmatched by any other law school in such a short period of time.

CARDOZO HIGHLIGHTS

- * The number of applications for admission to Cardozo has more than doubled in the past five years, from approximately 2,500 to almost 5,000.
- * The top quarter of the entering class of 2006 scored in the top 6 percent of all LSAT takers—a 166 or higher.
- * The median LSAT score for the entering class was a 163—the top 11 percent in the country.
- * Entering students come from more than 150 undergraduate schools—14 percent from the Ivy League.
- * Among all US law schools, Cardozo ranked 30th in student quality measured by median LSAT.
- * Cardozo is among 15 leading law schools supplying talent to the top 20 law firms.
- * Cardozo's programs in Intellectual Property and Alternative Dispute Resolution are ranked 4th and 7th in the nation, respectively.
- * More than 400 students participate each year in one of 16 clinics, six journals, or in moot court.

J.D. Students

Our admissions picture reflects the explosive popularity of Cardozo among prospective law students, enabling Cardozo to establish the highest, most competitive admissions criteria. The top quarter of the class entering in fall 2006 scored in the 94th percentile (166) or above on the LSAT, and had a GPA of 3.72 or above. The class's median LSAT score reached the 89th percentile (163), and the median GPA was 3.55.

Alternative Entry Program (AEP) Students

Students can begin their studies at Cardozo in January, May, or September and may complete the 32 credit first-year curriculum in different ways. As a result, students may not have all of their grades or know their journal status at the time they register for fall recruitment. These students will qualify any references to GPA with a notation such as, "as of XX credits." Following is an overview of the various programs.

JANUARY ENTRY

Students begin their studies in January and earn 16 credits in the spring and 16 credits in the summer. They complete the J.D. requirements in two and a half years.

MAY ENTRY

Option 1: Students begin their studies in May and earn 15 credits in the summer and 17 credits over the course of the fall and spring semesters, allowing students to take upper-level courses in their first year. Therefore, some of them will have completed courses beyond the 32 credit required curriculum by the end of their first year. Students complete the J.D. requirements in two and a half years.

Option 2: Participating students complete 11 credits in each of the summer and fall semesters and 10 credits in the spring.

SEPTEMBER ENTRY

In addition to the traditional program, which consists of 16 credits in each of the fall and spring semesters, students may complete 11 credits in both the fall and spring semesters and 10 credits in the summer.

Guide to Academic Credentials

A student's grade point average is calculated each semester by the Office of the Registrar. The work of each student is graded pursuant to the following academic standards:

- A = Excellent (4.00)
- B = Good (3.00)
- C = Fair (2.00)
- D = Poor (1.00)
- F = Fail
- W = Withdrawal without penalty

The symbols “+” and “-” are affixed to grades A through C to indicate the upper and lower thirds of the ranges covered by those grades. Letter grades are translated into numeric grades to the third decimal (thousandth of a point).

Cardozo has consistently resisted grade inflation. To assist in your evaluation of our students' transcripts and/or grade sheets, you should be aware that the faculty is constrained by the following limitations in the assignment of grades:

Range of mean grade for first-year courses: 3.10–3.20

Range of mean grade for upper-level courses with more than 25 students: 3.10–3.33

GENERAL STUDIES LL.M. can be an avenue for study of a range of issues and subjects in legal theory or US law generally. General LL.M. program students select from virtually the entire Law School curriculum in constructing a program of study. Lawyers from abroad and J.D. graduates of US law schools seek the degree to broaden their academic and professional horizons.

INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY LAW (IP) LL.M. is the capstone of Cardozo's IP program, which is ranked among the nation's strongest. Students who complete the LL.M. in IP Law have an invaluable edge in their understanding of this complex, dynamic, and ever more important field.

COMPARATIVE LEGAL THOUGHT LL.M. is a coherent and focused program that takes advantage of Cardozo's world-renowned faculty in the areas of jurisprudence, law and philosophy, law and religion, and law and literature. Perhaps the first of its kind, the program is for those interested in teaching or wanting to study legal theory in depth.

Cardozo's Lawyering Curriculum

Clinics

Students are competitively selected to participate in one of Cardozo's nationally recognized and unique clinical programs, gaining practical experience combined with strong academic scholarship.

ALEXANDER FELLOWS PROGRAM—Students work full-time for a semester as law clerks in a federal judge's chambers.

BET TZEDEK LEGAL SERVICES CLINIC—Students represent elderly or disabled clients in civil matters.

CRIMINAL APPEALS CLINIC—Students do intensive appellate advocacy, and draft and argue an appellate brief in court.

CRIMINAL DEFENSE CLINIC—Students work with clients from their initial interview through trial and sentencing.

FAMILY COURT CLINIC—Students are placed in Family Court or with an attorney representing clients in Family Court.

GENOCIDE AND HUMAN RIGHTS CLINIC—Students design and implement creative solutions to improve the lives of victims of human rights abuse.

HOLOCAUST CLAIMS RESTITUTION CLINIC—Students investigate and pursue claims made by Holocaust survivors.

IMMIGRATION LAW CLINIC—Students work on immigration matters such as political asylum and permanent residence cases.

INNOCENCE PROJECT—Students work on motions and briefs regarding the reopening of cases and reversal of convictions using DNA evidence.

MEDIATION CLINIC—Students serve as mediators at dispute resolution centers in the metropolitan area.

NYC LAW DEPARTMENT APPELLATE EXTERNSHIP—Students write appellate briefs on civil matters in state and federal courts.

PROSECUTOR PRACTICUM—Students intern full time for a semester at the Manhattan D.A.'s office as student assistant district attorneys.

SECURITIES ARBITRATION CLINIC—Students are assigned to arbitration cases referred by the NYSE, NASD, and AAA.

TAX CLINIC—Students have primary responsibility representing clients in tax disputes.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS WORKSHOP—Students are placed in government or not-for-profit organizations.

US ATTORNEY'S OFFICE EXTERNSHIP, S.D.N.Y.—Students work full time with the AUSAs in the criminal division.



Internships/Externships/Training

Students get hands-on experience through internships and externships with major law firms; global corporations; city, state and federal agencies; judges; and district and US Attorneys' offices. They work under the direct supervision of an attorney or judge at each placement.

CREDITED INTERNSHIP PROGRAM—Students gain hands-on legal experience throughout the public sector.

HEYMAN / ACCA IN-HOUSE COUNSEL INTERNSHIP PROGRAM—Students are placed with in-house legal departments.

INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY EXTERNSHIP PROGRAM—Students are placed in organizations in the practice of intellectual property law.

INTENSIVE TRIAL ADVOCACY PROGRAM (ITAP)—Two-week immersion course that trains students in cutting-edge strategies for negotiation and courtroom litigation skills.

LABOR AND EMPLOYMENT LAW EXTERNSHIP—Students work in law firms, government agencies, or unions on labor law issues.

NYC LAW DEPARTMENT INTERNSHIP PROGRAM—Students assist attorneys in various divisions.

Center for Public Service Law

Cardozo is deeply committed to instilling students with an understanding of the critical role of public service in the practice of law. The Center for Public Service Law brings together a variety of projects and programs to enhance public service opportunities for students and graduates, including professional employment, clerkships, internships, discussion panels, symposia, public service funding programs, and job fairs.

The Center assists students and alumni in obtaining internships as well as summer and full-time employment with judges, government agencies, and public service organizations. Cardozo sponsors a number of programs to support students in their efforts to gain practical public service experience and to assist them financially in their contributions to the public sector.

PUBLIC SERVICE SCHOLARS are competitively selected for scholarships based on high academic achievement and a demonstrated commitment to public service.

FELLOWSHIPS provide funding and oftentimes placement in public service. Among them:

Recruiting at Cardozo

Every fall and spring, representatives of private and public sector employers interview our students at Cardozo, in their offices, and through virtual interviews using our teleconference technology.

ON CAMPUS INTERVIEWS: Registration forms and invitations to interview are mailed to employers in mid-February for fall recruiting and mid-November for spring recruiting. Registration is accepted by fax, mail, or phone after the invitations go out.

On campus interview dates are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis beginning with Early Interview Week in late August. Interviews can be 20, 30, or 40 minutes and employers may request a full- or half-day schedule. We are happy to accommodate hospitality suites and greeters. There is no charge for interviewing on campus. Confirmation of an employer's on-campus dates will be sent approximately two weeks after the registration is received by our office.

RÉSUMÉ COLLECT: The Office of Career Services will prescreen applicants for an employer based on the objective criteria provided to us. We will then forward résumés that most nearly match an employer's hiring needs. After identifying résumés of interest, the employer may invite the student(s) to interview at their offices, or schedule a block of time to interview students at Cardozo.

DIRECT MAIL: Students are instructed to contact the employer in writing with their résumés and credentials by a date selected by the employer. The employer then notifies the student if he or she is selected for an interview.

FALL RECRUITMENT EMPLOYER SYMPOSIUM

(Late Spring) All employers who plan to interview on campus in the fall are invited to participate in a "Table Talk" symposium to meet our students.

LUNCHES / RECEPTIONS FOR 1L STUDENTS (Spring) Employers come to campus to sponsor a lunch or other reception for interested 1L students. The employer often sends a small group of attorneys and recruitment professionals who share firm experiences, providing some insight on the employers "personality."

DIVERSITY RECEPTIONS OCS will publicize employers' receptions and other opportunities for law students from diverse backgrounds.

PRACTICE AREA SYMPOSIUM (Late November) Employers meet informally to familiarize students with the broad range of legal practice areas.

PRACTICE PROFILE LUNCH SERIES (Twice weekly) Throughout the academic year, practicing attorneys come to campus to meet students at an informal brown-bag lunch and speak about their practice areas.

INTERVIEWING FOR THE PRIVATE SECTOR & OTHER CAREER SKILLS WORKSHOPS (Spring) OCS hosts a number of career skills-building discussions and workshops, including interviewing, networking, job searching, and more. We invite attorneys and/or recruitment professionals to participate in these events.
